

Ingredients

300 g macaroni not the quick cook stuff, which really doesn't work in this recipe
30 g butter
25 g flour
500 ml milk
1 tsp Dijon mustard
200 g mature cheddar (or to taste), grated
Salt and pepper to taste


Instructions

Preheat the oven to 220C / 200C Fan / Gas Mark 7.

Cook the macaroni until it's a bit less done than normal – a couple of minutes less than you would usually do. The brand I use takes 10 minutes normally, so I give it 8 minutes for macaroni cheese.

While the macaroni is cooking, make the cheese sauce. Melt the butter in a medium sized pan on a low heat. When the butter is foaming, add the flour and stir until it's mixed in. Then keep cooking for 2 minutes, stirring frequently. It takes guts to do this. It looks like something is going to go wrong but it doesn't!

Very gradually add the milk, stirring constantly. Make sure each bit of milk is incorporated before adding the next bit. If you do this slowly on a very low heat, you should end up with a perfectly smooth cheese sauce with no lumps and no need to whisk. However, if it does go wrong for some reason, you can always use a whisk to beat out all the lumps!



When all the milk is incorporated, add the mustard, salt and pepper. Then add half the cheese, stir to combine and turn off.

When the pasta is done, drain it, retaining a little bit of the cooking water.

Tip the pasta and a couple of tablespoonfuls of the cooking water into the cheese sauce and stir.

Pour the macaroni cheese into a shallow ovenproof dish and sprinkle over the remaining cheese.

Bake in the oven for 10 minutes. The top should be brown but the bottom should still be saucy and the macaroni should be perfectly cooked.

BACKSTORY


Over the years, many people have asked us about the origin of Emmaus and whom the individual known as Abbé Pierre was? So here it is; The first Emmaus Community was founded in Paris in 1949 by Father Henri-Antoine Groues, better known as Abbé Pierre, a Catholic priest and former member of the French Resistance during the Second World War. He was also a member of parliament and from this position he fought to provide homes for those who lived on the streets of Paris.

One night, a man called Georges was brought to Abbé Pierre after a failed suicide attempt. Georges had been released after 20 years in prison, only to find his family was unable to cope with his return home so became homeless. Abbé Pierre asked Georges to help him to help the homeless mothers who came looking for support from him.

Georges became the first Emmaus Companion, living with Abbé Pierre and helping him to build temporary homes for those in need, first in the priest's own garden, then wherever land could be bought or scrounged.

The founders of Emmaus charity were inspired by this story and chose the name Emmaus to represent the idea of companionship and support on a journey and from the Gospel of Luke.



Abbé Pierre

Born: August 5th 1912 Lyon
Died: 22 January 2007 Paris

In 1951, Abbé Pierre resigned as an MP to devote himself to fighting homelessness and poverty. Until then he had used his salary to pay Georges and the other 18 men who had joined them to set up the first ever Emmaus Community and to raise money they became "rag pickers", collecting things that people no longer wanted and selling them on. This was the start of the first Emmaus social enterprise.

Emmaus Communities opened across France. Abbé Pierre became an international figure and travelled the world spreading the word about Emmaus.

Abbé Pierre continued to campaign until his death in January 2007 aged 94. His funeral on 26 January 2007 at the Cathedral of Notre Dame de Paris.

ORIGINS OF EMMAUS IN THE UK

- The first Emmaus was opened in the UK in 1992. There are now 24 communities spread across the UK.
- Each one has at least one shop or social enterprise, with many running successful cafés, shops, gardening projects and removal companies.
- There are now more than 600 Emmaus companions living at communities stretching from Glasgow to Dover.
- No two Emmaus communities are the same - each has its own individual personality, providing a set of services which meet the needs of its local area.





Mental Health Awareness Week 2023

Mental health difficulties can be both a cause and a consequence of homelessness. Figures show that 45% of people experiencing homelessness have been diagnosed with a mental health issue. This rises to 8 out of 10 in people who are sleeping rough.

The relationship between homelessness and mental health is a two-way street. Mental health issues can be one of the factors that push people into homelessness.

And experiencing homelessness and insecure housing can cause or worsen mental health problems.

Homelessness Matters Podcast

Our Homelessness Matters podcast highlights the many reasons someone may become homeless and raises awareness about what being homeless truly means.

With over 1,000 listens so far, our popular Season 1 launched in 2022, and all five episodes are now available on Spotify, Apple Podcasts and more (links below).

In each episode you'll hear from someone with experience of being homeless who has received support from one of our 30
